We hope this booklet provides key information about the role/s, and inspires you to join our governance team to help make our schools even better for the children we serve. We believe that strong governance is a vital aspect of a successful school and trust.

What is Mercia Learning Trust?

ercia Learning Trust is a charitable partnership (a multi-academy trust) of six local schools. Unlike maintained schools run by the council, the trust is directly accountable for school standards and financial management to the Secretary of State for Education. Over half of the schools across the country and in Sheffield are organised in this way. Whilst our academy structure and organisation is important, we work together because we think partnership is a good thing. We believe a group of schools, leaders, staff and governors who work together can make their schools even better for every child, and the staff who work in them.

Our shared mission is to:

Work as individual schools, and in partnership, to ensure every pupil, whatever their background, will attend an exceptional school. We believe pupils should enjoy school, feel safe and fully supported, be inspired to learn, develop character and aspiration, and realise their full potential.

5 Members – these are the most senior tier of governance. They are the guardians of our constitution, have the power to appoint and remove directors, and meet annually to receive the audit / trust annual report

6 Trustees / Directors - these are the tier of governance that holds most responsibility. They oversee trust strategy, nce, policy, finance, risk and audit, and all aspects of business management (ICT, HR, estates). They meet sig times a year, and the Chair and Vice Chair meet with the CEO each week

6 Local Governing Bodies (LGB) – Each school has an LGB that meets six times a year. They are responsible for supporting and challenging school senior leaders regarding standards (teaching, pupil progress / attainment, behaviour, attendance & support for vulnerable students). Each LGB has a Chair and Vice Chair and up to 10 governors (some of whom will be staff and parents /carers).

What do governors do?

he primary task of school governors is to provide support and challenge, so that each school maintains and improves its effectiveness. This usually involves getting to know the school through visits, reading papers, attending meetings, discussing and agreeing school improvement priorities, scrutinising school performance (curriculum and teaching, behaviour, attendance, personal development and leadership), focusing on key aspects such as safeguarding or the performance of the most vulnerable children; monitoring feedback from children, parents or staff or ratifying policy. Trustees primarily focus on school effectiveness, but are also responsible for overall trust vision and strategy, finance, human resources and resource management (e.g. estates, ICT etc.) Together, governors at every level help schools and the trust to keep on track and focus on what really

Which schools are part of the Trust?

he trust currently has six partner schools in the south and south west of Sheffield for children aged 2 to 18+ years. Each primary school feeds into a trust secondary school. Collectively we educate over 4500 children (this will rise to 5000 by 2024), employ nearly 500 staff and are supported by over 70 governors, all of whom are volunteers, at a variety of schools and different levels. Why become a governor?





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Q: Will I have to complete any formal application?

A: During the process of appointment you will be asked to complete an application form. This will confidentially collect key personal information, your experience, skills and competencies and declarations in order for the trust to complete necessary statutory safeguarding checks.

Q: How long is the term of office?

A: The usual term of office for a school governor and Trustee is 4 years.

Q: Is this a paid role?

A: Governance is an entirely voluntary role. Our Governance Handbook describes this commitment as follows; 'At the heart of governance in a charity like Mercia Learning trust is the governance team, made up entirely of volunteers. These individuals bring their experience and judgement, and accept accountability, not for material benefit, but for the greater public good. In particular, to improve the life chances of the pupils/young people in our schools'. Taking part will develop your experience and skills, as well as giving something back to your local community.

Q: What training will be given?

A: You will be guided through an effective induction, attend school or trust led training, and have access to comprehensive National Governor Association (NGA) or Learn Sheffield training packages.

Q: What time commitment is required?

A: Governors/trustees attend a minimum of 7 meetings a year. These usually take place on a weekday between 6–8pm.

Outside of meetings, additional time will be required to read papers and/or attend training or school events as required.

Those who hold positions as Chairs can expect to give even more time.

Q: What do I do if I am interested in being a governor or Trustee?

They will explain the role more fully and the process by which you should apply. Depending on the role, a governor can be appointed by the local governing body or may have to engage in an election.
